Dear Friends,

2025 had so many highlights and marked our first full year as Mem Global. This name reflects the truly global community that has grown around this work, bringing together young adults from Los Angeles to Buenos Aires to Cape Town to the Baltics, and everywhere in between. In 2025, Mem Global Community Builders hosted more than 13,000 programs, bringing Judaism to life for over 81,000 young adults around the world. With our 20th anniversary quickly approaching, it's especially meaningful to see how this organization has grown, proudly encompassing all that it means to be a Jewish young adult in this moment.

In 2025, that spirit came to life across our programs. More Moishe Houses and Pods opened around the world, including five new NAIM (North American Israeli) Moishe Houses, which remained vital spaces to celebrate Israeli culture in the diaspora. At the same time, hundreds of Moishe House Without Walls (MHWOW) Hosts built vibrant communities, bringing Jewish life to every corner of the globe.

Young adults around the world enjoyed immersing themselves in Jewish adventures. At learning retreats, participants studied Jewish literature, cooked classic dishes, gave back through service, and more. 96 Retreatologists welcomed 1,460 participants to inventive weekend experiences, while at Camp Nai East and on the Nai Cruise, 280 campers relived the magic of Jewish summer camp.

Base and the Jewish Learning Collaborative (JLC) continued to flourish, showing the passion for Jewish learning across our network; and across 15 cities, Embark helped interfaith couples learn and grow together through rabbi-led cohorts. Though no two programs are the same, they all saw young adults bringing Judaism to life with joy, creativity, and enthusiasm.

In September, we traveled together to Warsaw, Poland, for Global Con, a training conference that brought together Residents and Hosts from 15 countries. Seeing those young adults together was something special, and the enthusiasm that they have for this work was palpable.

As the needs of young adults continue to evolve, we are always diving into new ways to support their leadership, learning, and curiosity. This year, Mem Global launched the Kolective, a new program helping Jewish young adults lead dynamic events for hundreds of their peers. This and other new initiatives deepen our mission of turning this pivotal life stage into a vibrant period of exploration and connection.

In this report, you'll peruse the menu of ways that Jewish young adults engage in Jewish life at Mem Global. We hope that it whets your appetite for all the adventures, learning, and connections still to come.

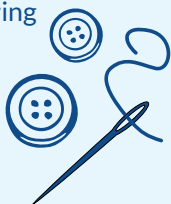
WELCOME TO THE CLOTHING REPAIR CAFE!

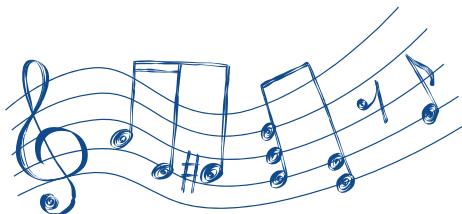


Passover Special!

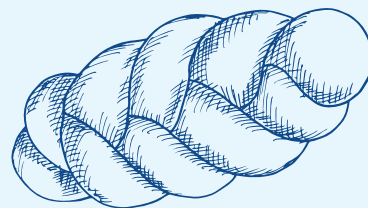

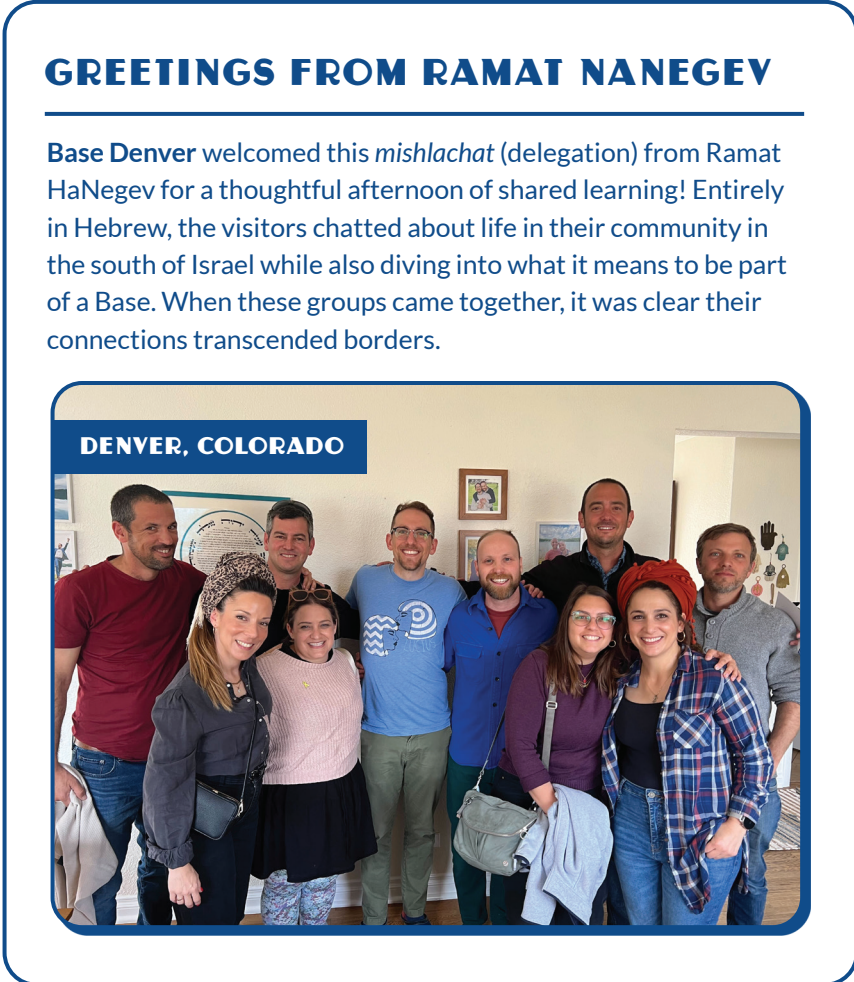
SUMMER IN ISRAEL (IN UKRAINE)

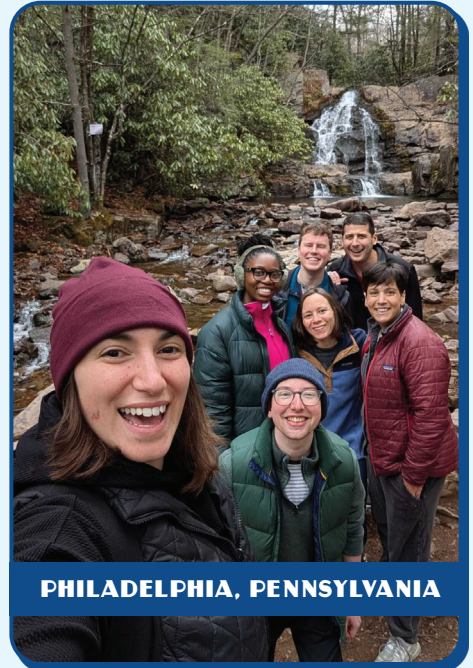


A SONG FOR SUKKOT

SMOOTH SAILING

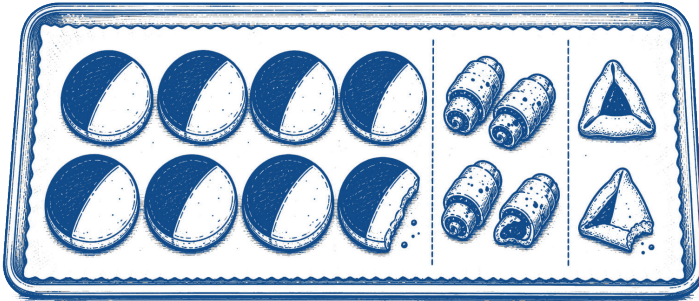

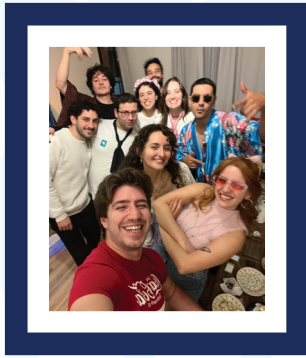
